Dear Parents / Guardians of English I Students:

Reading during the summer develops lifelong reading habits and it is an important part of West Senior's English curriculum.

Summer reading for the 2022 school year is mandatory. During the summer, students must read one of the books listed on the attached page. Students will complete a written assessment in English class during the first week of school. We recommend students take notes while reading their book and/or bring their book to class the first week.

Each grade level has a different list, so students should be sure to choose from the list that corresponds to the grade level they are entering in September. *Students entering Grade 9 Honors, English III Enriched, English IV Enriched and AP/Hilbert 12H have a different assignment.* Students who are enrolled in one of those classes in the fall but did not receive the assignment specific to that class can access the correct assignment on West Senior's website under *School Resources* and then under *English Summer Reading*.

The books on the list cover a wide range of reading levels and genres. If needed, students can receive help selecting a book from the list by speaking to their English teacher or Mrs. Knaze, West Senior's school librarian, before the end of school in June. While students may want to purchase a copy of the book to bring it to school in September, it is also possible to borrow the book from the library. Depending on availability, students can check out their selected book from West Senior's library before school ends in June or borrow it from the public library. An electronic copy of the book may be obtained using SORA, accessible through the West Senior library's web site at http://wswshs.wscschools.libguides.com/home, or through the West Seneca Public Library's catalog of ebooks and via Overdrive at https://bepl.ent.sirsi.net/client/en_US/default. If students are borrowing a book/e-book from the library, they should take notes as they read to review before the in-class written assessment. Students will not be permitted to use their phones to access ebooks or notes.

We believe this program will enhance our students' reading skills.
