The Popularity Papers: Research for the Social Improvement and General Betterment of Lydia Goldblatt and Julie Graham-Chang by Amy Ignatow

In a quest for upward social mobility, two fifth graders try changing their looks, taking up new hobbies, and making new friends. They



record their amusing successes and failures scrapbook style.

The Glitch in Sleep by John Hulme *

12-year-old Becker Drane is a fixer and must fix a huge problem in the world so that people will be able to sleep. If he can't do it in time, the earth will be destroyed!

Ninth Ward by Jewell Parker Rhodes

12-year-old aspiring engineer Lanesha, abandoned by her own family, lives in the Ninth Ward of New Orleans with elderly Mama Ya-Ya, a former midwife and medicine woman who also has psychic powers. Trapped in the attic by Hurricane Katrina's floods, they help each other ride out the storms both outside the window and inside themselves.

The Emerald Atlas by John Stephens

Following their parents' disappearance, 14-year old Kate and her younger siblings, Emma and Michael, grew up in a series of orphanages. After moving to the dismal town of Cambridge Falls, the trio discovers a mysterious book. When Michael tucks a historic photo into the book, they are transported to an earlier time when the town is held captive by an evil witch. Prophecies, wizards, hidden treasures, an ancient evil, and tantrum-throwing dwarves all make appearances in this fast-paced, engaging, and humorous tale.

Bill Pennant, Babe Ruth, and Me by Timothy Tocher

In 1920, sixteen-year-old Hank finds his loyalties divided when he is assigned to care for the Giants' mascot, a wildcat named Bill Pennant, as well as keep an eye on Babe Ruth in Ruth's first season with the New York Yankees.

Drizzle by Kathleen Van Cleve

Polly Peabody lives on an unusual rhubarb farm where it rains at exactly 1 p.m. every Monday, and some of the plants taste like chocolate. When Aunt Edith shows her a secret room, a library, filled with writhing ivy and bugs that fly in patterns that spell out words, she is thrilled. But then the rain stops, plants start to die, Polly's brother becomes ill, and Aunt Edith pressures Polly's dad to sell the property. Now Polly must interpret the farm's signs and symptoms to figure out the problem and the solution. Fun, quirky new fantasy.

Moon Over Manifest by Clare Vanderpool 2011 Newbery Medal Winner

Alternating between World War I and the Great Depression, this tale of the eclectic people and mysteries of Manifest, Kansas is told through a mix of letters, newspaper articles, and a fortune teller's tales.

As Simple As It Seems by Sarah Weeks

Verbena Polter gets through a difficult summer of turbulent emotions and the revelation of a disturbing family secret with an odd new friend who believes she is the ghost of a girl who drowned many years before.

Dragon Keeper by Carole Wilkinson

The last remaining dragon belonging to the ancient Chinese Emperor is Long Danzi who is able to escape from his cruel keeper by coaxing Ping, a slave-orphan girl to assist him in his flight. This adventure leads her to discover her true destiny.

Summer Reading Recommendations (6th - 8th)

Hi parents! I've compiled a list of books that I think your kids will enjoy over the summer. I know that reading over the summer will only help your child continue to succeed. Books with an asterisk next to them, I have not personally read. I hope you find this list helpful! :) Choose at least One book to read over the summer. Write a short summary of the book you read.

"Refugee" *

 Parents need to know that Refugee by Alan Gratz is a historical novel that braids the stories of three young refugees in three different time periods and settings: 1938 Berlin, 1994 Cuba, and 2015 Syria. The circumstances of all the kids and families are dire, and their journeys are fraught with imminent danger.

"Down and Across" *

Parents need to know that *Down and Across* is a coming-of-age story about an Iranian American teen boy who runs away on a quest to learn about perseverance and success. Scott lies to his parents about where he is and takes off for Washington, D.C., where he meets new friends and tracks down a Georgetown professor he believes can help him sort out his life. The story examines the effects of the pressure some immigrant parents put on the their children to succeed. Scott learns a lot of good lessons about responsibility and honest relationships

You Go First*

Parents need to know that *You Go First*, by Newbery Medal winner <u>Erin Entrada Kelly (Hello, Universe</u>), is told by two kids in alternating chapters -- a 12-year-old girl in Pennsylvania and an 11-year-old boy in Louisiana -- over the course of a week. Although they live in different states, the kids bond over an online game of Scrabble and help each other deal with their family and friendship issues. Characters use mild insults including "idiot," "dork," "nerd," and "loser." <u>Bullying</u> is a large part of the book, but kids will learn about the importance of family and the power of friendship, <u>courage</u>, and <u>perseverance</u>.

Books I've read for the eager reader:

I Will Always Write Back: How One Letter Changed Two Lives

 Parents need to know that I Will Always Write Back is the true story of unlikely pen pals that begins in 1997, when 12-year-old American Caitlin and 14-year-old Zimbabwean Martin are randomly paired by their schools. It's told in the first person, with chapters alternating between Caitlin's and Martin's points of view, as the two forge a life-altering friendship despite significant cultural, economic, and geographical differences. The disparity between their lives is stark; Caitlin is a typical middle-class American teen engaged in petty dramas involving friends and boys, while Martin goes hungry daily and struggles to find the funds to stay in school. When Caitlin sends him a dollar so he can see American currency, he can buy enough groceries to feed his family for two weeks. Martin is hesitant to disclose just how poor his family is but eventually opens up to Caitlin as his situation grows more desperate. Caitlin, with help from her tireless mother, ultimately changes Martin's life, as well as the lives of his family members. Martin, in return, opens Caitlin's eyes to the world outside her small rural town.

• Walk Two Moons

Parents need to know that Walk Two Moons is a complex novel of self-discovery in which a 13-year-old girl explores her cultural and personal heritage, and her country, all at once. This Newbery winner is rich and rewarding on many levels, with three generations of memorable characters, relatable families, and a sensitive portrayal of feelings of loss in a girl just approaching adulthood.

• The Uglies Series *

o Tally has grown up in a post apocalyptic world where, at age 16, everyone is given an operation that makes their faces and bodies perfect. Before the operation they are known as "uglies" and after as "pretties." After the operation they live in New Pretty Town, enjoying a life of constant partying and pleasure. Tally can't wait. Shortly before her 16th birthday she befriends Shay, who tells her about the Smoke, a secret community of those who refuse the operation. When Shay runs away to join the Smoke, Tally is given a choice by the Specials, the secret police: Help them find the Smoke and betray her friend, or remain an ugly forever.

Help! My child doesn't want to pick up a book this summer:

Hatchet

o Parents need to know that <u>Gary Paulsen</u>'s <u>Hatchet</u> is an intense, fast, exciting read. The main character is a 13-year-old boy whose parents are divorced. He survives a plane crash in the Canadian wilderness en route to visit his father and

must use the hatchet his mother once gave him to stay alive. Many kids report that this is the first school-assigned book they fell in love with.

Ghost

Parents need to know that Ghost, written by Coretta Scott King Honor author Jason Reynolds (The Boy in the Black Suit) is a story about overcoming tragedy and finding where you belong. The first of Reynolds' middle grade Track series, it includes themes of bullying and abuse, and parents should be ready to discuss alcoholism, nonviolent ways to stand up to bullying, pursuing things you're passionate about, and finding reliable mentors.
