

Items of Note:

• We had a very large turnout for Bob Poczik's program – The Great Wall of China (55 people attended). Bob will be back for a fascinating presentation on Abraham Lincoln in September.

- As mentioned last month, we have spent the past several months giving out eclipse glasses. By the end of March, I estimated we had given out about 3,500 pairs during February and March.
- Sarah's special programs were very popular and well-attended. This included Crack the Code Egg Hunt (34 attended), Spring Cookie Decorating (34 people attended), and Rangoli & Egg Decorating (17 attended).
- Our large shredder became inoperable and we were unable to fix it. We were able to order another one through the Central Library and the Friends generously funded this purchase.
- Update on HVAC Project (from Tim Lavocat as of 4/12/24) Tim just recently contracted with two (2) consultants to perform the final assessment and feasibility study to determine best options for the HVAC system improvements/replacement and ultimately a preferred solution. As he moves through this process, Tim will keep me informed on when he needs to access the building and then ultimately what the findings are and a path forward to an actual project. The consultants plan to get started soon.
- Solar Eclipse As mentioned last month, we have spent the past several months giving out eclipse glasses. By the end of March, I estimated we had given out about 3,500 pairs during February and March. The Clarence Library hosted the Buffalo Museum of Science on March 16 for an all-ages eclipse program.
 - Sarah presented a Solar Eclipse Makery on April 3, which included eclipse buttons (made with the library's button maker), eclipse flipbook and a suncatcher. The Clarence Youth Bureau was here on April 4 to present a Solar Eclipse craft time, which included an eclipse chalk drawing and eclipse art.
 - Eclipse glasses recycling the Library System is collaborating with Astronomers without Borders to give eclipse glasses a second chance where they will be sent to communities across Africa, Asia, North and South America and will be given to people who would otherwise not have access to eclipse glasses that allow them to view an eclipse safely.
- The Clarence was the host location for Mental Health Advocates "Nurtured Heart" program on April 15 and April 22. This program is sponsored by the Clarence Family Support Center.
- Together with Dia Celebration As of this writing, Dia has not yet taken place... more information on the how the program went will be available next month! What I can say now is that great deal of work went into planning and promoting this program. In addition to all of the emails, social media flyers and word of mouth promotion, Monica and Aaron delivered 2,000 flyers to the four elementary schools in Clarence. And there was a front page article in the Clarence Bee as well. We are really looking forward to the celebration and thank all of the groups and individuals who have helped to make this a special day.
