### **Financial**



### **Items of Note:**

- Circulation and patron visits were down (4.6% and 9.8% respectively) compared to last April. The reason for this decrease is uncertain.
- Public access computer usage was also down (6.8%) and WiFi usage was up very slightly (0.9%).
  - Interestingly, children's program numbers were up dramatically from March. This had to do with our children's programs, including Crack the Code egg hunt and Wooden egg decorating programs that were both well-attended.
- Sarah's story times were popular in April, as was the Lego Club.
- We offered several good programs for adults including our monthly Study in Sherlock, Master Gardener series #1 (Sustainability) and History of Buffalo series #1(The Erie Canal).
- The Friends of the Library Spring Book Sale ran April 30 through May 3 and was very successful.
- Outreach As mentioned in last month's report, Monica and Sue Powers visited Clarence Center Elementary School 4<sup>th</sup> grades classes on April 23. We have since received two large thank you cards and 60 paper hearts ("I Love My Library Because...). These are on display behind the front desk. Sarah attended the Ledgeview Literacy Night on May 2 and spoke with many families about the library. More outreach events are coming up in May, June and July.
- Train Day is also coming up at the Clarence Public Library! This event will be held on June 7<sup>th</sup> from 10 am to 1 pm and will feature working model railroads and a visit from Frank Pastore from the National Model Railroad Association.
- Monica and Sarah are working on the summer reading program and scheduling summer programs and we have some wonderful upcoming programs that will complement this year's summer reading theme—Color Our World.
- The Clarence Public Library will be hosting the next YSG meeting (May 22) and ACT Meeting (May 31).
- Monica is working on the Literacy Hub and has received approval from the Central Library to have our decodable book kits cataloged so that they can be requested by our patrons. More decodable kits have been processed in the past few weeks with more to come! Monica will continue to curate materials for the Literacy Hub over the next several months.
- Monica reached out to Assemblyman Paul Bologna and invited him to the June 28<sup>th</sup> Summer Reading Kickoff event. Assemblyman Bologna is also offering a Summer Reading Challenge in partnership with the New York Libraries program and we will be

distributing the Summer Reading Challenges at the Summer Reading Kickoff and throughout the course of the summer.
