

Items of Note:

- After the solar eclipse, we collected Eclipse glasses for "Astronomers without Borders." The Clarence Library is listed as one of their drop-off locations nationwide. We plan on collecting the glasses through May 20 and then will ship them to the Astronomers without Borders redistribution center.
- Together with Dia (Children's Day/Book Day) was a well-received by the community. We had around 200 people attend them program that included story times (in several languages) by guest readers, a guitar concert by students from the Hispanic Heritage Council Guitar Initiative, crafts of different cultures (presented by Sarah McLean-Plunkett, Central Library's Children's Services Department and APAPA), and face painting with the Clarence Youth Bureau. In addition, the Clarence Community Foundation and the Friends of the Clarence Library were on-hand to give away free books to children attending the event. The books were purchased as part of an in-kind donation from the CCF. The Friends of the Library also purchased some of these books. Any remaining books will be given away at an outreach event on June 29 (Fireworks in the Park formerly Day in the Park). The Dia event was also made possible with a grant from the Community Foundation of Greater Buffalo Daniel C. and Beatrice M. Fisher Fund.
- The Friends annual Spring Book Sale took place May 1 –May 4 and we resumed programs and events in the meeting room on May 6.
- On April 23, Girl Scout Troop #30507 was at the library for a tour and activity which were conducted by Librarian Sarah McLean-Plunkett and part-time Librarian Nick Schuessler. The purpose of the Girl Scouts' visit was to learn library skills and work toward one of their badges.

- On May 1, I conducted a tour of the library for a homeschool group. I also went through steps on how to best utilize the library's online databases for research.
- On May 9 and May 10, Sarah and I conducted a class visit for the 4th grade classes from Clarence Center Elementary. This was an opportunity for the kids apply the skills they have learned in both their writing and social studies classes. In this case, the topic was the American Revolution. Sarah presented a PowerPoint on how history is not just a straight line of events and I read the book *Henry and the Cannons*. Following the presentation and read-aloud, the kids broke into groups and worked on a critical thinking activity based on what they just learned. The final part of their visit gave them time to look for one book on the American Revolution and one book of their choice. The kids (and teachers) enjoyed their visits and the plan is to have them back again next year and possibly make an outreach visit to their classroom at the school.
- I attended the Manager-Director Meeting on May 8 at the West Seneca Library and completed fire extinguisher training. Sarah attended the Youth Services Group meeting at Central in the afternoon of May 9.
- On May 13, I met with a patron who is starting a small business and wanted information on how to create a marketing plan. I showed the patron how to use portions of the Data Axle Reference Solutions database (formerly Reference USA) as well as how to navigate the American Community Survey (Census.gov) for statistics that would help in creating a small business marketing plan.
- Greg Kinal was at the Clarence Public Library on May 9 for a fascinating presentation on the Lusitania. Fifty six people were in attendance. Mr. Kinal will be back on June 6 for a presentation commemorating the 80th anniversary of D-Day.
- HVAC Update On May 16, I met with Town Engineer Tim Lavocat and Town Councilman and Library Liaison Bob Altieri. The purpose of the meeting was for Tim to give to update me on the project. Currently, the project is in the study phase with 80% of the report complete. Soon, the project will shift to the options phase to determine the best solution for replacement of the HVAC System. Then will come the non-binding cost estimates from contractors. When this information is available, I will be able to prepare and submit the grant application by the due date of September 3.
- Program planning for summer is currently underway. The kickoff is planned for Monday, July 1 at 5:00 pm with the Clarence Center Volunteer Fire Company, crafts, face painting, and family movie night. Papa's popcorn event truck will be in the library parking lot selling popcorn. Many fun and exciting programs will be happening this summer! Stay tuned...
