Director's Report – Clarence Public Library October 27, 2025

Financial

The monthly financial statements are included in the board packets. There has not been payroll report generated yet this month.

On October 15, all library staff received an email from Emily Patronik, the Chief Financial Officer for the Library System to let everyone know that County Executive mark Poloncarz released his 2026 proposed budget. Some key highlights for the Buffalo &Erie County Public Library System-wide Budget include:

- System Total 2026 Operating Budget is \$36,080,059
- System Total 2026 Grants Budget is \$639,881
- As a System, we received a 3.0% increase in the Library Real Property Tax Levy.

Emily reminded us that this is just the proposed budget and things can change by December when the Legislature votes to adopt the final budget.





Notes on Statistics:

September's circulation and patron count statistics are baffling to me since we had a substantial decrease in circulation over last year but yet we also had a significant increase in patron count for the month. The reason? We are not sure; however, if you note the increase in programming numbers for September 2025 over September 2024, this could be a contributing factor to the increase in visits. We also had three class visits in September, including two homeschool visits and one visit from Ledgeview. (The other Ledgeview visit took place in early October). The decrease in circulation is more difficult to pinpoint, but may be partially a reflection of increased use of e-books, which do not get counted with our regular circulation numbers.

Items of Note:

As mentioned above we had several class visits, including a two planned visits by a large homeschool group for their library skills requirement. The students were taught how to use the library catalog to find materials and were also given opportunity test their skills by going out into the library to find specific materials. The students also learned the basics of compiling a bibliography for a research paper and how to determine whether a source, either in print or online is credible or not.

We welcomed four third grade classes from Ledgeview Elementary. Two classes visited us on September 26 and two classes visited on October 2. These students were taught the basics of searching for materials in the library and many of the students received their first library card! All students were given an opportunity to select and check out books. From the feedback we received from the teachers (and from some of the students), everyone enjoyed their trip to the Clarence Public Library.

Construction Grant Update:

We recently made a "Children's Classic/Classic Series" section and also weeded many of the series that were in poor condition or did not circulate. We are in the process of relabeling and relocating many of our juvenile series titles into juvenile fiction and put many of the long-running series (e.g. Magic Tree House) in their own sections.
