



Notes on Summer Statistics and programming:

Overall, we had a busy summer, particularly at the end of June, as we had a very successful summer reading kickoff program the last week of June. Circulation was up and patron visits were up that month. In July and August, circulation dipped slightly from last year, but we were up slightly in patron visits and programming numbers remained strong and higher, for the most part, than last year. One of the things we noticed in July and August were the high amount of patrons who registered for programs but did not attend. We then began posting signs and asking patrons to call us if they are unable to attend a program for which they had registered. For several programs, we called patrons ahead of time to remind them. Programs such as Story Time, Play Date, Meet Snickers the Dog, Crafternoons and Evening Paint Nights had the highest registration, while programs such as Lego Club, Board Game Afternoon and Family Fun Nights had the lowest registration numbers. The Mike Seege Magic Show was the exception with high registration and attendance numbers.


We decreased by four readers 5 and below, but increased by 20 for readers 6-12.

How many of your summer reading programs included parents/caregivers? This question is asking the adult parent/caregiver breakdown (as opposed to total attendance submitted on the monthly programming form) for all summer programs, not just the combined audience question (although those should be included as well). Some programs may require a higher level of involvement by parents, especially when it comes to helping access a virtual program or completing an activity.

What was the total attendance of parents/caregivers? For those higher involvement programs, an estimate of 50% of attendees would be reasonable, but please adjust the number as needed.

All of our programs had the involvement of caregivers. Out of the 873 attendants at programs targeting children and families approximately 291 adults/caregivers attended. Last year attendance for adults was mandatory and they were not always involved. This year there was active involvement that was not mandatory. In the craft programs, many of the adult participants completed a craft themselves instead of merely sitting with the child. This is true of the children's programs as well. For the family story times, there were also more participants of all ages. This year we reoriented with a Playdate that had the involvement of numerous caregivers as it was geared to walkers and toddlers.

How was your summer reading publicized, and how effective were these methods? Also, what publications did you use to promote your programs?

Our programs were promoted in The Clarence Bee, on Facebook and Instagram as well as our website. We also published information on websites geared toward families. We had a large infographic display in the library in addition to our bulletin board. Sarah McLean-Plunkett who runs our storytime and craft programs visited Sheridan Hill which accounted for our largest number of Summer Reading Participants in 2022. We hope to schedule school visits earlier this year in order to accommodate all the schools.

Our librarian Sarah Mclean-Plunkett also reached out to the Ledgeview Elementary School PE teacher Stephanie Stevens to run/teach cardio drumming sessions at our library. She was amazing and she also offered to conduct reading sessions with her therapy dog Snickers. Monica, our director, was happy to host Snickers. What we did not realize is that Snickers is a local celebrity and children waited in the hallway for him to arrive with Snicker's tee shirts on jumping up and down in excitement to see him.

We also had a visit from Senator Gallivan on July 18. Director Monica Mooney, Board President Judy Hilburger, and Trustee Sue Powers took him on a tour of the library and Children's Reading Garden.

We continue our partnership with the American Red Cross by hosting a Blood Drive on August 15.

We also forged a new partnership with the Iroquois National Wildlife Refuge. They came to the Clarence Public Library for a July evening of Feathers, Fur, and Family Fun.

Other Items of Note:

- The Clarence Public Library hosted the University Express/Erie County Department of Senior Services Book Club on Friday, September 15. The event was a hybrid virtual and in-person program and was well-received.
- Director Monica Mooney mailed out 25 letter to local nursing homes, and senior care and memory care facilities to promote our Memory/Reminisce Kits that we purchased with funds from the Daniel C. and Beatrice M. Fisher grant funds. A few agencies did respond and we will be setting up an outreach program with at least one of the local facilities where we would set up a monthly schedule for drop off and pick up of kits to the specific facility based on their needs and requests.
- Director Monica Mooney applied again this year for Daniel C. and Beatrice M. Fisher Fund grant. This year, the focus is on Family Literacy and Supporting ENL Initiatives. Grant applicants will be notified in November if funding was approved.
- On September 12, the Clarence Public Library distributed Emergency Care Kits through an Erie County Initiative. All libraries in the BECPL received kits to distribute. The kits were very popular and had to be reserved ahead of time.
- After receiving quotes, we have selected Cleaner Carpets (Clarence, NY) to do the library's carpet cleaning. This will take place on October 9 when the Clarence Library is closed for Columbus Day-Indigenous Peoples' Day.
- We have several interesting programs/author visits and speakers coming up in the next month and a half author Burt Freiman (*Darker Shades of Night*), author Karen Wielenski (*Pieces of My Puzzle: A Personal Journey Through the 50s, 60s, 70s and Beyond*), speaker Bob Poczik (will review Candice Millard's *River of Doubt*) and historian Bren T. Pryce from the Buffalo Presidential Center will present "Presidents In Buffalo).
- New Staff We welcomed Meredith Baron to our staff on September 11. Meredith is a page and is also pursuing her Master's Degree in Library Science.
