President Adam Zaremski called the meeting to order at 6:01pm.

1. There were no comments from the audience.
2. A motion (MB, SR) to approve the Minutes of the Meeting: November 18, 2025 was carried by a voice vote.

The curated content is pre-downloaded onto the device, so no Wi-Fi is required. With 14 hours of play per charge, they are perfectly portable for keeping curious minds busy while traveling. These portable, screen-free kits support literacy and creativity without the use of cameras, microphones, or advertising.
The Director demonstrated the Yoto Mini Player Kits for the Board. Hopes to obtain more if popular with patrons. They have been circulating well so far.

June shows on Roycroft Weekends and worked with Nancy Grannis from Norberg's, the frame shop that was on the Roycroft Campus.

Shy by nature, Miller was not, by any means, an aggressive business person when it came to marketing his talents. His sister convinced him a

decade ago to have a show of his paintings at her East Aurora house that was very successful.

Aurora to Offer Narcan Sites Overdose Remedy will be Available 24 Hours in Three Town Locations

The nasal spray used to combat opioid overdoses will soon be available at three locations in the Town of Aurora.

Town Board members approved a proposal from Councilman Joseph Mc-

Cann to establish the sites the night of Monday, Feb. 24.

Narcan, a nasal spray that often reverses the effects of an opioid overdose, will be placed in boxes outside the Aurora Town Public Library and the shed near the library on Main Street and the Aurora Municipal Center on Oakwood Avenue.

McCann proposed the locations to allow anonymous use at all times.

"All these will be outside so they will be available for access 24 hours a day," he said.

In addition, McCann plans to begin exploring the possibility of a needle-dropoff site.

The East Aurora Police Department does not accept needles or pills, but Police Chief Patrick Welch voiced support for needle collection.

"There's a lot of needles

out there," he said. "It might be something to look into to have something like that."

Besides drug users, diabetics and those who inject weight-loss medications use needles and need a place to dispose of them, he added. Police tell residents to take needles and unwanted pills to pharmacies.

The department used to collect pills but has discontinued that program.

If the town establishes a needle-dropoff site, Welch believes it should be indoors and open only during business hours to prevent theft.

In other matters, the board:

- Asked Brigid Maloney, town attorney, to prepare a local law that would issue a six-month moratorium on rezoning requests while the board finishes its comprehensive plan.

- Rescheduled a public hearing about a request to rezone Mario's Bistro and Brews at 1342 Quaker Road from 6:30 p.m. Feb. 24 to 6:30 p.m. March 10 at the beginning of the next board meeting. The

owner, John Lattanzio, has asked for a zoning change from rural residential to commercial 1.

- Heard from the attorney representing Kathleen Miller, who owns the property at 145 Reiter Road, during a public hearing. Miller wants a special-use permit to create a two-bedroom apartment above a three-car garage.

- Granted temporary-use permits for the Borderland Music + Art Festival from Sept. 12 to 14 and the Lancaster Depew Soccer Club's annual tournament from July 25 to 27 in Knox Farm State Park.

- Approved an \$8,979.93 payment to repair a snow plow truck.

- Awarded the project for culvert replacements at Church Street and East Fillmore Avenue over Tannery Brook to Oakgrove Construction in Elma for \$1,557,548.

- Named Benjamin Garvey as an alternate Planning Board member.

The board approved all items 4-0 with Councilman Luke Wochensky absent.

East Aurora sister honors late twin brother with first solo art exhibit

Like every person who has or will enter the community room in the Aurora Town Public Library through March 23, Jennifer "Jenny" Higgins saw a new side to Jeffrey Drake Miller – her twin brother.

Miller, who died in November 2023 at the age of 73, was a well-known local artist whose work is currently being featured in a solo exhibit in the Aurora Town Public Library. The diverse exhibit, which features 25 of what Higgins thinks are Miller's best pieces of artwork, was Higgins' idea.

Higgins always knew her younger twin brother was talented – especially after he mastered drawing a comic flip-book as a child.

Throughout his years growing up, Miller and his brothers managed to fill their time with countless projects including making go-carts, building an underground tunnel tailored after "The Great Escape" movie and constructing tree houses.

For the last 20 years before his death, Miller, who also worked as a carpenter, worked on the grounds team at the East Aurora Country Club – implementing new and artistic ideas throughout the course.

During that time, Miller's passion for art flourished. He developed a devoted commitment to watercolors through the inspiration from local accomplished artists such as Robert Blair, Hugh Laidman and Rixford Jennings

who instilled a lasting and indelible impression on Miller as to the full range and dimension of this versatile medium. Later influences would lead Jeff from the paintings of Ted Kautzy, Norman Rockwell and Andrew Wyeth to the timeless works of the Dutch masters most notably Jan Vermeer.

Miller's watercolor paintings appeared in such national exhibitions as the American Watercolor Society of New York, the National Arts Club of New York, the National Academy of Design, the American Artists Competition, the Niagara Frontier Watercolor Society of Lockport and the Adirondack National Exhibition of Watercolors in Old Forge, New York.

Despite his talent, Higgins admits it often took some convincing for her brother, a juried artist, to promote his work – specifically in a solo exhibition. Higgins knew the community needed to see what a well-versed artist her brother was – hence the exhibit title, "A One Man Exhibit: A Memorial Tribute to the Artistry of Jeffrey Drake Miller."

"I just didn't want to leave it in a box somewhere," Higgins, a resident of East Aurora, said. "My whole life I have known him to be so talented."

From out of these artistic endeavors, also grew a love of furniture making, and hard-scape projects. Miller, who never married nor had children, built his beloved home in Bliss, New York "from the ground up."

Higgins noted, "Everything Jeff touched turned to art."

Many of the pieces in the exhibit are pieces Higgins had never seen or heard about – and only saw when she was cleaning out his studio after his sudden death. Just when she thought her brother could not be anymore creative.

"He was a self-made artist," Higgins, who is eight minutes older than her twin, said. "His natural talent was just so evident."

The exhibit received critical acclaim from visitors when it opened last month – welcoming hundreds from all over Western New York.

"Jeffrey embraced his passion for art with humility, rarely promoting his remarkable gift," Aurora Town Public Library Director Paula Ausberger said. "Watercolor is notoriously unforgiving, but he mastered the medium, becoming prolific in his own right."

The director added, "Many have drawn comparisons between his work and that of Andrew Wyeth, a testament to his undeniable talent."

The exhibit also expands out into the entryway, with a display case featuring more of Miller's diverse pieces – designed by Higgins.

Having his first solo show in East Aurora is a sentimental thing on its own. Not only was it where Miller's art career took off, but it was where he spent his formative years – before his family relocated to Massachusetts before their junior year of high school.

The twins, who are the first of five children, would go on to graduate from Hingham High School in Hingham, Massachusetts. However, Jenny admits the East Aurora High School Class of 1968 still welcomes the twins as unofficial East Aurora graduates.

Higgins, a retired teacher, said sharing her late brother's

talent has helped her grieve and heal from his sudden death. She added that her brother's artwork brought them closer in adulthood. March 16 will be the twins' 75th birthday.

"It was such a sudden thing and such a loss of a creative human being," Higgins said. "But this has been helpful to me to immerse myself in him."

Higgins plans to continue to display her brothers' work and sell other pieces and use the proceeds to fund art scholarships for local students.

The display is open during regular library business hours: 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. Monday, Tuesday and Thursday, 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Wednesday, 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Friday and 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Saturday.

"His life did not end when he died. It's still going forward," Higgins said. "And I'm enjoying that."

He was an American-born Barbizon-style artist, who specialized in portraying both French and Western New York landscapes. His home was on Walnut Street and became the home of Kitty Turgeon. His flamboyant presence in East Aurora, starting in 1903, spanned 45 years during the height of our Arts & Crafts years.

This particular painting is hung in the children's section where it receives the illumination necessary to make out the sheep in the crepuscular light. Signed and dated "Paris, 1898," the painting was restored by the Patricia and Richard Garman Art Conservation Department at Buffalo State University.

Ausberger is delighted to display the art, especially since the library's summer theme will be "Color Your World: Art & Creativity." This painting joins four other Four-

niers: "Moonlight Near Barbizon," a gift from the artist and three paintings which were given to the library by Dorothy Roth: "Spring Plowing," which evokes the hillsides of South Wales; "Clearing After the Rain," and "Grant Dake's Barnyard," framed in an original Roycroft oak frame.

On the east wall of the library is a portrait of Alexis J. Fournier from 1914, painted by A.V. Warshawsky, that was gifted to the town by Mrs. Fournier.

Over the library fireplace is featured "Moonlight" by another Roycrofter of artistic note, Sandor Landeau. His connection to Fournier while in Paris eventually brought Landeau to East Aurora in 1915. His masterpiece, "A Prayer for the Lost at Sea," which won him the prestigious gold medal prize at the Paris Salon of 1907, is another treasure owned by the Aurora Historical Society. For years it hung in The Roycroft Chapel and is now on display in the Roycroft Campus Museum.

Other Fournier treasures are on display in The Roycroft Inn on South Grove and the Elbert Hubbard Roycroft Museum on Oakwood Avenue. Call 716-652-4735 to arrange a tour.

But since summertime brings the time and opportunity for reading growth, I am delighted to write this column to recommend books for summer reading for children.

Let's celebrate our country this July with books from authors from the north, south, east and west, and begin with an author from the north (Minnesota). Specifically, let's begin with a book from the one and only Kate DiCamillo. DiCamillo started a new series in 2024 with "Orris and Timble: The Beginning" [Age/Difficulty level: ages 5-8, 80 pages, Candlewick Press, The Bookworm price \$14.44]. If you're not familiar with DiCamillo's previous work, she's the author of many childhood favorites such as "Because of Winn-Dixie," "The Tale of Despereaux" and "The Miraculous Journey of Edward Tulane." "Orris and Timble: The Beginning" starts off the trilogy with an unlikely pair of animal friends. Orris is a rat who enjoys his solitary life until Timble, an owl, finds himself in his company. DiCamillo has the utmost gift for creating endearing and approachable characters that live with you beyond the page. Experienced readers in first grade through less experienced readers in third grade will enjoy these books. I love how DiCamillo brings her talent of creating endearing and approachable characters to a younger audience with just 80 pages, rather than her usual 250-300 page chapter books.

Let's continue our journey by moving to the east. Specifically, to East Aurora (see what I did there?). Local Parkdale Elementary School teacher and author Amber Partisano has written "Our Fox Rocks" [Age/Difficulty level: ages 3-10, 42 pages, Palmetto Publishing, The Bookworm price \$13.49]. Partisano wrote the book after her daughter, Tessa, was diagnosed with FOXG1 in March 2023. FOXG1 is a rare neurological condition that affects brain development. With FOXG1, one may have low muscle tone, involuntary muscle movement,

vision impairment, possible seizures, feeding and sleep issues. As a veteran elementary educator and lifelong lover of books, Partisano had always dreamed of writing her own book. After writing her book, and being able to share and bring awareness to others, Partisano has a new appreciation for life's small joys. It has transformed how Partisano approaches parenting, teaching and even writing. Our Fox Rocks is not only an enchanting children's book, it also builds understanding and empathy for all.

Let us move south with yet another book by Kate DiCamillo (yes, she currently lives in Minnesota, but her books are pure gold and they deserve another recommendation. Plus, when she was young, she lived in Florida, Ha!). "Ferris" [Age/Difficulty level: 8-12 years, grades 3-7, 256 pages, Candlewick Press, The Bookworm hardcover price \$16.14, paperback price \$7.64] is her most recent book. The New York Times described "Ferris" as "balm for the soul," and I'd agree. Ferris Wilkey and her family of characters live in a big house with a lot of... charm. From her uncle painting the history of the world in the basement to her little sister deciding to become a fugitive to her grandmother seeing a ghost in the threshold of her room, Ferris' home is never dull. Ferris makes it her aim to help her grandmother with the ghost, but yet somehow, this book isn't a ghost story. Children describe this book as getting more exciting with each chapter. You and your late elementary/early middle school student may both fall in love with this one.

Wrapping up our cardinal direction tour with the west is Lynne Kelly's "The Secret Language of Birds" [Age/Difficulty level: 8-12 years, grades 3-7, 240 pages, Delacorte Press, The Bookworm price \$8.92]. I first learned of Kelly's writing with 2019's "Song for a Whale," and was so excited to read another book by this kind and empathetic writer. Middle school birdwatcher Nina is spending the summer at her aunt's summer camp. She's used to feeling left out (most recently, her family left her at a Buc-ee's gas station and got ten miles down the road before they noticed she wasn't in the van), and is hoping to find her

niche at the camp. While there, she discovers two majestic birds that by all accounts shouldn't be there. Just as she did in "Song for a Whale," Kelly's blending of longer, fictional characters with nonfictional animal information will quickly pull readers in (it reminds me how Jodi Picoult masterfully blends fiction and nonfiction in her writing for adults). Middle grade readers will enjoy reading "The Secret Language of Birds." And who knows: they may even join Brad Felton for some bird watching sometime.

So whatever direction you may travel or read this summer, to round out your adventures look no further than your own library (system). If you're looking for a way to explore new local locations this summer, join me in the Buffalo & Erie County Library "Passport to Reading" program. Pick up your passport at any library, and get a sticker for each location you visit. From June 2 through Aug. 15, visit as many library locations as you can (and to add even more to the experiences, these library visits could also be accompanied by a trip to a playground or museum by each library). After Aug. 15, fill out the last page of your passport, hand it in at your local library, and you'll be entered to win prizes. Huzzah! John Spears, head of Buffalo & Erie County Library System, has died following cancer battle

John Spears, director of the Buffalo & Erie County Library System, has died following a long battle with cancer. He was 51.

The library shared the tragic news in a Facebook post, writing, "John Spears will best be remembered for his leadership in advocating to protect intellectual freedoms. He was known for taking a prominent stance in encouraging funding for libraries to continue to provide free, equal, and equitable access to information for everyone."

Spears was appointed Library Director in Buffalo in April 2022 following a national search. He brought with him more than 25 years of library management experience having worked in libraries in Colorado, Missouri, Illinois, and Utah.

Spears was credited with taking immediate actions in early 2023 to ensure public safety at the downtown Central Library when the difficult decision was made to close temporarily in the wake of safety concerns caused by an influx of teenagers each afternoon. In 2024, Director Spears was honored by the New York Library Association

(NYLA) for innovative leadership in fostering relationships with all sectors of the community and libraries. He was also an active member, advocating for library funding and resources, through speaking engagements and published articles for the Western New York Library Resources Council (WNYLRC), New York Library Association (NYLA), American Library Association (ALA), Library Leadership and Management Association, the International Federation of Library Associations, and Public Libraries Magazine.

He leaves behind his partner, Brian Dimit, his father, brother, and sister, and many friends in the library, Elmwood neighborhood and the Buffalo Quaker communities.

A public Celebration of Life will be held at a later date.

Director's Report: December 2025

Just Keep Reading, Just Keep Reading...

Summertime, and the reading is easy. As a reading specialist at Parkdale Elementary School for 27 years, I've had students at all levels of excitement regarding summer reading. Finding just the right book(s) can be challenging, especially for reluctant readers. But since summertime brings the time and opportunity for reading growth, I am delighted to write this column to recommend books for summer reading for children.

In July, I shared books written by authors from around the country. August's column continues with the directional theme, but keeps us closer to home via the Buffalo & Erie County Library System. This summer, the B & ECLS system has brought back their Passport to Reading program, encouraging patrons to visit as many library branches as they can. A paper "passport" with room for stickers for each branch can be picked up at any library branch. Each section of the system (city, north, east and south) has its own page to fill up. As of the writing of this column, I'm proud to say that I've visited 32 of the 38 branches, with plans to visit all 38 by mid-August. Hooray! It's been a wonderful journey, filling not only my super cute library passport, but filling my soul with gratitude for library availability for ALL.

The prices this month are through the online bookstore www.bookshop.org. For those looking for the convenience of online shopping while continuing to support local businesses, www.bookshop.org is it. Bookshop.org was founded in 2020, and works to connect readers with independent booksellers all over the world. Every purchase on the site financially supports independent bookstores, such as The Bookworm in East Aurora. When ordering, just select which local bookstore you'd like to support with your purchase. Win-win!

This month, each book was checked out of a different B & ECLS passport area. I checked "DK Life Stories Queen Elizabeth II" [Age/Difficulty level: ages 7-11 years, 128 pages, DK Children Publishing, www.bookshop.org price \$6.50] out of the Alden Ewell Free Library in the 'east' section of the Passport to Reading. Many readers prefer reading nonfiction to fiction, and this series of books can be a way to get into all 31 titles in the series. Other important people in the series include Alexander Hamilton, Marie Curie and Barack Obama. This book would be wonderful for young Anglophiles, as well as older ones (I've personally been a fan of "The Crown" for years, and am planning a trip to the UK in the next few years). Its fairly simplistic word and sentence structure brings in earlier readers, and each page includes one or two photos/illustrations to support

the text. There is a glossary, index and timeline in the back of the book as well. "DK Life Stories Queen Elizabeth II" is a delightful way to introduce young readers to the memoir and biography genre.

My next recommendation was checked out of the Central Library, in the 'city' section of the Passport to Reading, "As Warm as the Sun" [Ages 3-7 years, 32 pages, Neal Porter Books, www.bookshop.org price \$17.66] by Kate and Jim McMullan is a story of two dogs that love a warm, cozy spot to rest. Toby loves warm, cozy spots, but when Pinkie joins the family, they have to learn to share the warmth. The book itself is good, but the version I checked out from the library made it even better because it was a Vox book. Voxbooks are "Books that Talk." Think of the old-school books-on-record, or books-on-tape, but with a modern twist. The book is read aloud digitally by simply pressing the start button on the inside cover of the book. When the reader hears the sound (for this book, a barking sound. How cute is that?), the page can be turned. I find Vox books to be a great compromise between children reading traditional print books and reading digital books. They're print books, but with the added accommodation of the auditory recording. A reader who can not yet read this book can still enjoy it independently, while the more experienced reader can choose to use the recorded version or not. Vox books are also great for building reading fluency: the reader can follow along with the printed words while hearing the book read aloud.

My third book recommendation this month is from the 'north' section of the Passport to Reading, the Grand Island library, "Clap When You Land" [Ages 14+ years, 448 pages, Quill Tree Books, www.bookshop.org price \$14.87] by Elizabeth Acevedo is a novel-in-verse for more older readers. This book deals with much more mature content, such as the death of a parent, unknown family connections and plane crashes. Two sixteen-year-old girls have lives that couldn't be further apart, but are drawn together in tragedy. The death of their father brings them together and introduces them. Written in verse, it masterfully ties together the worlds of the girls. Readers should be prepared for the difficult content of the book, but will also build empathy through reading how the girls' lives connect and bond. While some may dissuade teen readers from reading too much difficult content, I believe that reading about difficult content helps one to better deal with it in their life. "Clap When You Land" isn't a book to miss. My last title this month is not (yet) available from the Buffalo & Erie

County Library System, but I've suggested it as a purchase. In "The Fairytales of Lightfall Hollow," magical creatures from a magical realm share their life experiences and lessons learned to help humanity with its struggles. Written by Susan C. Ramirez and illustrated by Kathy Hebler, "The Fairytales of Lightfall Hollow" [Age/Difficulty level: ages 8 - adult, 204 pages, Mountain Laurel Press, www.bookshop.org price \$10] is a fantastical treasury of twenty-one stories of imagination and wonder, including the creation of the first fairies, fairy color mania, a broken-hearted dragon and mermaid librarians. When one thinks of the word fairy tale, one usually thinks of well-known stories such as "The Little Mermaid" and "The Three Little Pigs." However, "The Fairytales of Lightfall Hollow" provides the reader with new, unknown fairy tales (quite literally, the tales of fairies). The author's family had a cabin in the Allegheny Mountains of Pennsylvania, where these fairy tales were born. The book is the size and length of a children's chapter book. It could be read independently by an older (middle grade) reader, or it would be perfect for a bedtime read-aloud for younger (ages 8 and up) readers. I wish I had this book when my daughter Annie was younger. I can imagine reading a chapter a night to her before bed, and having the book inspire magical dreams of fairies and forests. I had the pleasure of meeting the author at the Greater Pittsburgh Festival of Books this past May, and she's just as wonderful as one may expect a writer of fairy tales to be.

Readers, thank you kindly for joining me on my 2025 summer reading journey. So until 2026, dear readers, just keep reading...

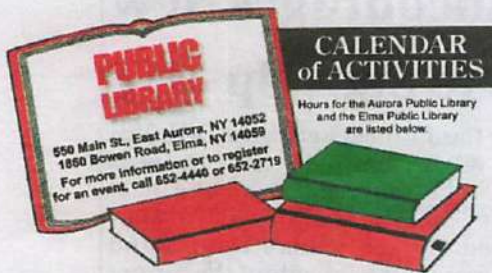

Celebrating literacy and libraries in Erie County

The Buffalo and Erie County Public Library reaffirmed its commitment to intellectual freedom and public service earlier this year by launching a new brand and a promise to remain "profoundly public." This update is more than a new logo or tagline. Profoundly public is a declaration: libraries are not passive spaces – they are active, essential forces for equity, education and civic life.

As a former educator, I believe in the importance of literacy and education. Books provide insight into our history and help us to understand other cultures. Books are also a way to explore what is possible. At a time when information is increasingly locked behind paywalls, curated by algorithms, or restricted outright, the public library remains one of the few institutions where access to knowledge is truly free and impartial exploration is encouraged.

The BECPL has also committed to investing over \$100,000 of donated funds across its 37 branches for public-facing equipment, technology and programming. This investment will give local libraries, especially those with limited resources, an opportunity to improve their spaces in a way that will directly benefit the public need.

While library branches are present in nearly every municipality across Erie County, services like the Bookmobile and Library by Mail provide access to those who may have a transportation or medical barrier. All library card holders also have access to apps like Libby and Hoopla, where patrons are able to download books, audiobooks, magazines, music and more!

The free Library by Mail service brings library materials to the home-bound through the mail on a long-term or short-term basis. Anything you can check out from the physical library can be checked out with Library by Mail including books (regular and large print), audiobooks, international language materials, CDs and DVDs.

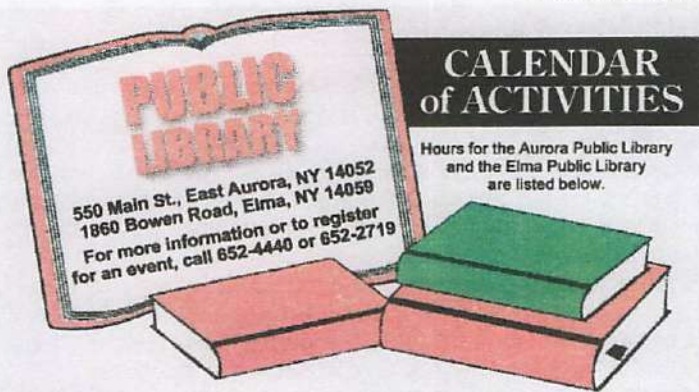

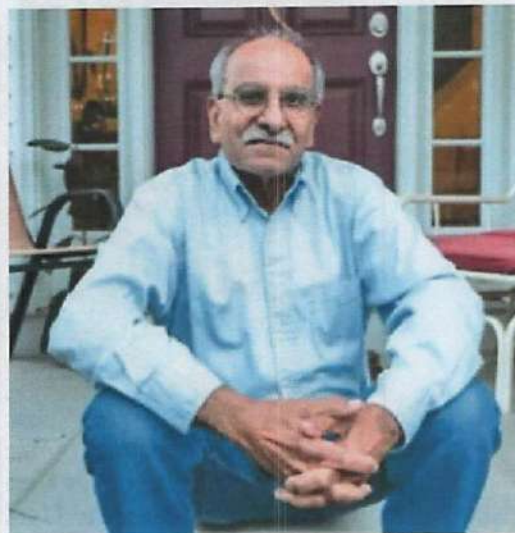
At just 18-years-old, Suchak made a daring escape from the island of Zanzibar in East Africa. Fleeing a repressive regime, political violence and the trauma of a genocide that tore apart the fabric of his family; he trusted his father's belief that boarding a ship with the ultimate goal of reaching America, would lead to a better life. Hidden aboard a steamship, escaping with nothing but hope in his heart, he risked everything for a chance at freedom, never seeing his father again.

His journey from stowaway to survivor unfolded not just across continents, but through dislocation, discovery and the long and onerous work to start anew in a country he had never seen.

Told with unflinching honesty and in vivid detail; "Last Boat to Freedom" traces the cost of survival - from the trauma left behind on the island, the perilous journey as a stowaway, brutal violence, and the first bewildering year in America. He learned firsthand what it means to belong in a land that promised freedom but didn't always offer acceptance.

Decades later, he returned to Zanzibar with his family, walking through the streets of his childhood, now transformed by time and memory. What he found was both familiar and foreign, a powerful reminder of what was lost and what was gained.

is a testament to resilience, perseverance, identity and the enduring power of a single choice.

Suchak was born on the island of Zanzibar off the coast of East Africa and coming-of-age through the bloody Zanzibar revolution and genocide of the 1960s. As a teenager, he fled his homeland under the cover of darkness as a stowaway with only 300 shillings and a passport and began a daring journey of perseverance and survival. He spent many of his formative years writing his thoughts on what had transpired during that journey that would eventually make their way into his story. More than fifty years later, "Last Boat to Freedom," his debut book, provides readers with a passionate and inspiring first person look into a childhood among the clove plantations of Zanzibar, the island's descent into darkness during the little-

known Zanzibar revolution and the eighteen months of unforeseen events that followed his escape. It culminates with his personal journey full of obstacles, tragedy and perseverance to find freedom and opportunity. Now living in the United States, he teaches at the University at Buffalo.

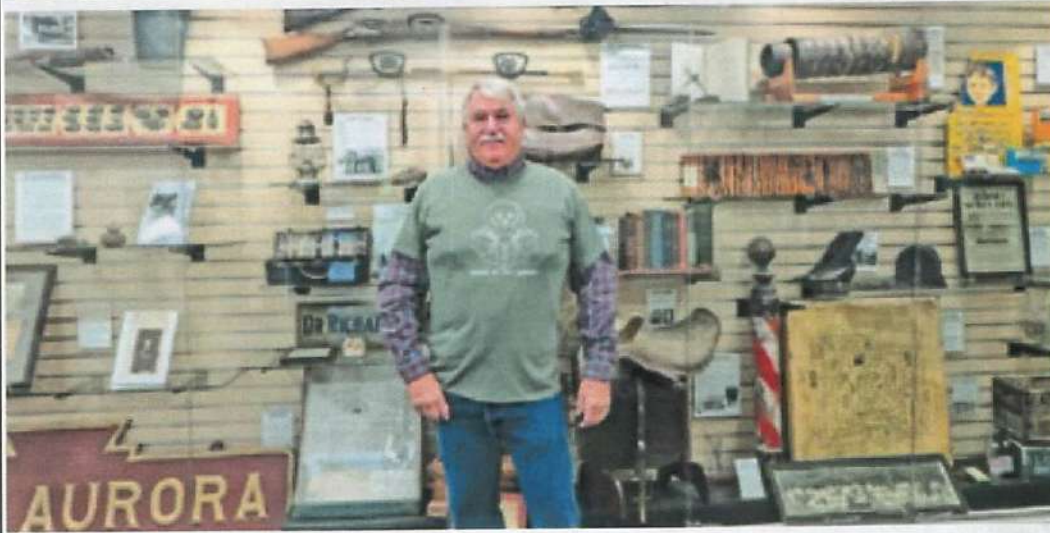

2026 Page wages increase to reflect the 12/31/2025 New York State minimum wage \$.50 per hour increase to \$16.00 per hour.

Corresponding increase in Sr Page wages to maintain \$1.00 per hour differential from Page rates.

Contractually obligated increases in personnel costs per Collective Bargaining Agreements in force as of January 1st 2026.

Adjustments in general operating revenues and expenses.

All other terms and conditions of the currently contract between the "Library" and B&ECPL will remain in effect per *Article 1 (C) Next Year Contract Extension*.

Adoption of 2026 Budget**

BACKGROUND:

On December 5, the Erie County Legislature adopted a 2026 County Budget with amendments. The Legislature-approved amendments did not change the County Executive's 2026 Proposed Budget allocation for the Library Fund.

The 2026 Operating and Grants Budget sustains library operations and services. It prioritizes public access to resources, programs and services to help us serve our communities. A county funding increase of \$928,420 (3%) will help offset inflation related impacts on library operating costs, including contractually obligated labor costs, increase in the minimum wage, costs of supplies and utilities in this challenging fiscal environment.

The Library's overall operating budget, including State Aid and library revenue, increases 4% from 2025's \$34,669,428 to \$36,080,060 in 2026. Including recurring grants, the combined total increase is 4.1% from 2025's \$35,270,846 to \$36,719,941 in 2026.

While not part of the Library's operating budget, the County's Capital Budget provides: \$160,000 in bonded funds for Vehicle Replacements and \$2,000,000 in "bonded funds for a Various Improvements & Upgrades.

The minimum wage increase directly impacts Part-time Page wages, \$16.00 per hour. Further, it impacts the competitiveness and the Library's ability to hire in positions with wages scales near the new rate. Part-time Page, and Senior Page positions are not represented by a bargaining unit. That means they are not eligible to receive wage scale adjustments without approval by the System Board of Trustees, which occurred as part of the budget process in preparing the 2026 Proposed Budget. Senior Pages will be increased to \$17.00 per hour.

WHEREAS, this funding will allow the Buffalo & Erie County Public Library (B&ECPL) to sustain operations, prioritizing public access to resources, programs and services to help us serve our communities, and

WHEREAS, it helps to offset inflation-related impacts on library operating costs, including contractually obligated labor costs, a \$0.50 per hour increase in the minimum wage, and costs of supplies and utilities in this challenging fiscal environment, and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees expresses its appreciation to the County Executive for recommending the funding and to the County Legislature in approving the recommended funding, and

WHEREAS, strong public support for the B&ECPL reinforces both the continuing need for innovative and responsive library services, now therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of the Buffalo & Erie County Public Library adopts the 2026 Budget, utilizing the following sources to provide library services in 2026:

\$31,875,741 – County Property Tax for Library Purposes

\$ 2,570,458 – New York State Aid – Operating Budget

\$ 1,200,000 – Use of Fund Balance

\$ 433,861 – Library Fines, Fees and Other Revenue

\$36,080,060 – Total Operating Budget

\$ 639,881 – Library Recurring Grants Budget

\$36,719,941 – Combined Operating and Grants Budget, further detailed in the *2026 Budget in Brief Charts*, and be it finally
