Winter Reading

A winter reading contest was held for all ages with 93 patrons participating! \$20 gift cards from Merit Badge Books were given to adults, children ages 0-5, and 6-12. Teens ages 13-17 won Amazon gift cards. Gift cards were generously paid for by the Friends of the Hamburg Public Library.

Blood Drives

Blood drives by the American Red Cross were held at the Hamburg and Lake Shore libraries in January, February, and March. All time slots continue to be filled at both locations with an increasing number of first time donors at the Hamburg Library.

Also, several mini-drives are scheduled on Fridays at the Hamburg Library throughout the year during the odd months. The goal is to increase blood donors.

Art Show

The West Seneca Art Society held its bi-annual art show in February. A total of 50 works were on display throughout the library. The next show is scheduled for August.

Advocacy Day

Librarian Branch Manager Nicole attended Advocacy Day in Albany on February 2 and 3. She met with several elected representatives with her colleagues.

Trustee Orientation

On February 9, this writer held a trustee orientation for new trustee Heather Jackson and Vice President Cate Lee. The presentation consisted of library history, the role of trustees, and certain laws and regulations. Pizza was served!

Learning Fair

On March 4, this writer was one of eight judges at the annual Learning Fair held at Union Pleasant Elementary. The students participating ranged from ages 5 to 8. Some of

the criteria they were judged on included Knowledge, Research, Interest Level, and Enthusiasm. Their level of knowledge and engagement was very impressive! Library Clerk Eileen's nephew won first place!

Girl Scout Tour

On March 9, this writer provided the special director's tour to a group of 14 Girl Scouts from troops 30417 and 34178. They received a tour, did a scavenger hunt, and a craft. Afterwards, they checked out books with their new library cards!

Association of Contracting Library Trustees (ACT)

On March 21, the Annual Trustee Workshop was held at the Central Library. This is an opportunity for library trustees to gain knowledge on their roles through various presentations offered. President Michelle Parker and this writer attended.

Scavenger Hunts

Scavenger Hunts in January and February.

Hamburg Library

In January the scavenger hunt theme was "Why did the Cookie go to the Doctor?" with 523 participants. In February children looked for items in the children's area and drew them on the scavenger hunt sheet. There were 569 participants.

Lake Shore Library

Jan Brett was the theme in January, which was based on characters from the book, *The Mitten*. Eighty-seven families participated. In addition, 29 children searched for a stuffed badger in an adorable mitten hidden in the library. February featured an Eric Carle Scavenger Hunt in celebration of Take Your Child to the Library with 163 participants receiving Eric Carle bookmarks, stickers, candy, and buttons as prizes. In addition, children searched for the hungry caterpillar as it traveled throughout the library.

Hamburg Library

Programs offered this month include:

LEGO Club

Senior pages Lauren and Emily coordinated LEGO Club, which is held the 1st Saturday and 2nd Wednesday of each month. This is for children ages 6-11. Children use their imagination to make wonderful creations. Afterwards, they are displayed in the children's area. Hamburg YES (Youth Engaged Services) volunteers assist with this program. In February there were 46 participants and in March there were 44 participants.

Story Time

Story Time was held with two sessions, one at 10:30am and the other 11:30am, every Wednesday for a seven week period. Each session consists of a welcome song and greeting, three stories relating to a theme, songs with movements and flannel boards for children's engagement, and a related craft at the end. This program is geared towards children 2-5 years old. Story Time had 168 participants total over 3 weeks in January and 179 over the month of February.




Baby Bounce

In February and March, Librarian Branch Manager Nicole held lapsit story time for children ages 0-2. The program is held on the 2nd and 4th Monday of each month. On February 23, there were 44 attendees. On March 12 there were 44 attendees. Each child receives their own book to hold during the program.

Kid Librarian

This program continues to be very popular!

Librarian Trainee Sarah hosted eight Kid Librarians, one each on January 24, January 27, February 3, February 4, February 17, February 24, March 3, and March 4. Kid Librarians were Addison Pokigo, Mason Frometa, Olivia Smith, Lucy Grabowski, Arlo Fanning, Miriam Levesque, Cora Stancliff, and Ainsley Jakubowski. The Kid Librarians worked with Librarian Trainee Sarah to curate a display of a topic of their choice to feature in the Children's Area. Addison chose the theme *Get Lost in the Pages*, Mason chose *Adventure Through LEGOs*, Olivia chose *Bunnies*, Lucy chose *Favorite Series*, Arlo chose *Adventure*, Miriam chose *Video Games and More*, Cora chose *Recommendations for Crafts*, and Ainsley chose *Magic, Mystery, and Murder*. Each Kid Librarian created a poster to display with their collection using the program Canva, and Cora created her own hand drawn artwork to display. The Kid Librarian program is for children ages 8 to 12 and helps children to feel a sense of ownership in the library and the Children's Area by creating their own displays.



Take Your Child to the Library

On February 7, Librarian Trainee Sarah hosted Take Your Child to the Library, which featured crafts, activities, and a book display with an Eric Carle theme. Take Your Child to the Library was an event that many branches of the Buffalo and Erie County Public Library participated in, encouraging families with children to come to the library. Activities included creating your own Eric Carle mosaic butterflies, an Eric Carle themed scavenger hunt, and Eric Carle coloring pages. There were 61 children who attended Take Your Child to the Library Day, and 20 children who participated in the Eric Carle Scavenger Hunt.



Button Day

Button day is held on the 1st and 3rd Thursday of each month. Supplies are placed on a table for participants. After completing their design, participants come to the public service desk to get their button made. In February there were 7 participants and in March there were 26.

Game Night

The library hosts Game Night the 2nd Thursday of the month. In February there were 5 participants.

Camp Create

Librarian Jordan hosted Camp Create, a monthly craft program for kids aged 6-12, on January 26 and February 23. In January, 20 attendees participated in making Pinecone Bird Feeders with peanut butter and bird seed. In February, 19 attendees created STEM rockets out of paper cups that launched with rubber bands.



Colorful Tuesdays

Librarian Trainee Sarah hosted Colorful Tuesdays from 5-7pm on Tuesday, February 3 and Tuesday, March 3. For February there were a total of 8 children and adults in attendance. For March there were a total of 11 children and adults in attendance. Colorful Tuesday is a passive program that provides coloring books, coloring pages and other coloring supplies for adults and children to enjoy while they are in the library.

Pokémon Club

Librarian Trainee Sarah hosted the program Pokémon Club for children ages 6-12 on February 12 and March 10 from 4-6pm. For February there were 15 children and 8 adults in attendance for a total of 23 attendees. For March there were 12 children and 10 adults for a total of 22 attendees. Children learned how to play the Pokémon Trading Card Game, which teaches them strategy, math, and improves reading comprehension. There were two adult volunteers from the community to help out with the program.

Children were also able to do Pokémon themed crafts, such as create your own Poke ball and Pokémon headbands, and to trade cards with other children.



Director's Book Club

Book Club is held the 3rd Friday of the month. February's title was, *The First Ladies* by Marie Benedict with 12 members in attendance. March's title was *Bewilderment* by Richard Byrne with 12 in attendance.

Book a Technology Trainer

Book a Tech sessions were held on December 19 and January 9 by a staff person from the Tech Know Lab. Patrons receive one-on-one training to get help with their tech needs. There were a total of 8 attendees. On February 5, 5 individuals took advantage of the training.

Hamburg Library Job Fair

On February 13, a job fair was held in partnership with the New York State Department of Labor. Twelve businesses were on hand, including New York State civil service, state police, and the department of corrections and community supervision. There were over 100 potential applicants seeking employment. This is a bi-annual event. The next job fair is scheduled for July 10

Cookbook Club

Librarian Trainee Sarah hosted the monthly Cookbook Club on February 18 and March 18 from 6-7pm. Everyone chose a recipe from the cookbook of the month and brought it to share. February's cookbook was *The Complete Autumn and Winter Cookbook* by

America's Test Kitchen, with 11 adults and 2 teens in attendance, for a total of 13 attendees. March's cookbook was *Ever-Green Vietnamese* by Andrea Nguyen, with 6 adults and 2 teens in attendance for a total of 8 attendees.

Special Author Visit

In celebration of Black History Month, Buffalo Common Councilmember Zeneta Everhart visited on February 18 to read books from the Zaire and Zeneta Book Club followed by questions and discussion about Black History. The program was sponsored by the Hamburg Coalition of Equity and Inclusion.

Meet a Goose!

On February 20, Sundance Farms visited the library. Sebastopol geese were the stars of the show. Eighty adults and children visited the Hamburg Public Library to meet and learn about geese.

Neighborhood Forest Trees

In February, Librarian Jordan registered the Hamburg Library as a coordinating institution for the Neighborhood Forest program. This program provides free trees to children of all ages to plant native trees that benefit the local environment. Parents could also choose to purchase additional trees. Registration for the trees closed on March 15 with a total of 288 children signed up to receive 303 trees. The trees will be delivered and distributed in April.

Escape Rooms

Librarian Jordan hosted nine Egyptian themed escape rooms during winter break in February with ages ranging from kids 9-12, teens 13-17, and family groups with children of all ages. Attendees had to solve a variety of clues to unlock a box and beat the escape room. In total there were 37 participants over 3 days of escape rooms.



Keeping Your Brain Healthy

On March 6, Rachel Salvaggio, LCSW UBMD Neurology – Center of Excellence for Alzheimer’s Disease presented on topics to keep your brain healthy. Topics included: Understanding Normal Aging, When to know to Ask for Help, and the Role of Nutrition, Physical Activity, and Lifestyle in Brain Health. Ten patrons attended.

Ferocious Femininity

On March 16, Local author Amanda Woomer presented on female vampires in folklore, film, and history. In this presentation, guests learned that the origins of vampires are surprisingly female, dating back to antiquity. She also talked about real women who were accused of being vampires throughout history. There were 20 patrons in attendance.

Teen Programming

Teen Advisory Group (TAG)

On Monday February 2, Librarian Jordan hosted the Teen Advisory Group (TAG) Meeting for teens in grades 7-12. At this meeting, 4 teens attended and helped plan upcoming programs including the next Teen Art Night and helped make decorations for the Escape Rooms later that month. On March 2, Librarian Jordan hosted another TAG meeting with 3 attendees. They primarily worked on creating a graphic to decorate the curved wall in the Young Adult section of the library.

Teen Dungeons and Dragons Club

Librarian Trainee Sarah hosted the program Teen Dungeons and Dragons Club on February 17 and March 14, for teens ages 13-17. On February 17, there were 11 teens and 1 adult in attendance, for a total of 12 attendees. On March 14, there were 5 teens and 1 adult in attendance, for a total of 6 attendees. In Teen D&D Club, the group plays the tabletop role playing game Dungeons and Dragons, journeying on a campaign together. The group oriented game improves social-emotional learning skills, fostering a collaborative environment focused on teamwork, critical thinking, and problem-solving. The game also strengthens communication, storytelling, and creative thinking skills, as well as improving math and reading skills. The Teen D&D Club is made possible by the help of a volunteer who leads the campaign.

Displays

For February, Librarian Trainee Sarah made a display in the Children's area "Celebrating Black History Month," featuring stories by and about important Black figures in history. Sr. Page Emily made the display "Blind Date with a Book," which featured various surprise Adult and Young Adult fiction books. For March, Sarah made the display in the Children's area "Women's History Month" and "International Women's Day," both featuring stories about important women in history, and about women's fight for equality. Sarah made displays in both the Children and Adult areas for "National Craft Month," which featured crafting books and local resources. Her final display was created in the Young Adult area, called, "In Our Tech Era," which features books about technology and those who work in the tech fields.

Sr. Page Mary also made displays in the Children's and Adult areas for "March Madness," featuring fiction and nonfiction books about sports.





Lake Shore Library

Programs offered this month include:

StoryTime ShookUp!

Library Associate Laurie held storytime on Tuesdays in February and March for children ages 2-5 with a focus on literacy, listening, and socialization. The children read classic Eric Carle and Pete the Cat stories. They sang songs, shook eggs and made crafts with 181 attendees.



Baby Bounce

Baby Bounce was held on Tuesdays in February and March with Library Associate Laurie for children ages 6 months–2 years. Children engage in music and play. The babies were introduced to classic board books, finger plays, and songs. There were 139 attendees.

LEGO Club

LEGO Club was held on February 28 and March 14 with 26 and 21 attendees respectively. After completing their creations, they are displayed for a month throughout the building.




Adult Book Club

Classroom Collections
