Blood Drives

Blood drives by the American Red Cross were held at the Hamburg and Lake Shore libraries in September and October.

Scavenger Hunts

Scavenger hunts were held at both libraries during September and October.

Hamburg Library

October's scavenger hunt theme was witches and ghosts with 406 participants.

Lake Shore Library

September's Scavenger Hunt was themed for Hispanic Heritage Month. Participants found pictures native to Central and South America around the library. Each participant received a sticker. There were 80 participants.

October's Scavenger Hunt was themed for the Buffalo Sabres. Participants found hockey images around the library. Each participant received a sticker prize. There were 75 participants.

Therapy Dogs

Hamburg Library

On October 19, Kruz visited with 10 children and adults in attendance. He has become very popular! Unfortunately, he had to cancel his November visit.

Lake Shore Library

On October 2, Lake Shore Library's new reading dog Paddy debuted at the library along with his owner Elongia Farrell. Six participants read stories to him in the Children's area.

Library Advocacy

On September 25, this writer was one of five panelists participating in a webinar entitled, Effective Library Awareness: Engaging Representatives Locally and in Albany. The session was designed to equip professional academic, school, public, and special, library staff with the resources and knowledge needed to effectively organize local meetings with legislators, navigate Library Advocacy Day in Albany, and stay engaged in library advocacy year-round. The webinar was sponsored by the Western New York Library Resources Council (WNYLRC).

On September 27, this writer met with Erie County Legislator John Mills at the Hamburg Library to discuss various funding needs. He was given a packet, which included information on programs and given a tour. He was very impressed with the size of the building and what the Hamburg Public Library offers.

On November 13, Librarian Nicole, Trustee and vice president Cate Lee, and this writer attended an advocacy meeting with Senator Patrick Gallivan in McGrath Library at Hilbert College. Topics of discussion included construction aid funding, staffing, and providing social workers in libraries.

Intersect Unconference 2024

On October 11, Librarian Stephanie was a presenter at Intersect Unconference 2024. This year's event, held at the Central Library, was entitled, Innovate or Stagnate: Embracing Necessary Changes in Library Practices. Stephanie presented on the topic of passive programming with Lackawanna Public Library Librarian Trainee Leah Mosher. They discussed what passive programming is and its benefits. Several examples of programs for all sizes and types of libraries were given. There were 30 colleagues in attendance. This event is sponsored by the Western New York Library Resources Council (WNYLRC).

WNYLRC Annual Meeting

On October 22, Librarian Stephanie attended the WNYLRC's 58th Annual Meeting held at the National Comedy Center in Jamestown. A tour was given; lunch was served; and Library All-Star Awards were given out.

On November 9, two trees were planted on the grounds of the Hamburg Library courtesy of ReTree Hamburg. An elm was planted at the parking lot entrance. A tree with yellow leaves (not sure of the type ©) was planted at the Buffalo Street entrance.

Committees

Librarian Stephanie and this writer have volunteered to be on the System's Records Management Committee. The committee is charged with developing a policy and coming up with best practices for the handling of records.

This writer has volunteered for the Village of Hamburg AARP Steering Committee. The Village was recently enrolled into the AARP Age-Friendly Community of Networks. The committee is charged with coming up with a resident survey to establish some baseline knowledge about the areas that our residents think the Village is doing a good job in, and areas where maybe the Village could implement some improvements. This may expand into the Town.

Hamburg Library

Programs offered this month include:

LEGO Club

LEGO Club was held on October 5 and 9; and November 2 and 13, with Senior Pages Lauren & Sarah. Children used their imaginations to make unique creations, which were then displayed in the library. A total of 31 children attended in October and a total of 45 children attended in November.

Director's Book Club

Book Club was held on October 18 and November 15 with 12 and 15 members each. October's book title was *The Curator* by Owen King. November's title was *Remarkably Bright Creatures* by Shelby Van Pelt. The discussions are always lively and fun.

Cookbook Club

Librarian Trainee Sarah hosted the monthly Cookbook Club on October 16. Everyone chose a recipe from the cookbook of the month and brought it to share. October's title was 101 Greatest Soups on the Planet by Erin Renouf Mylroie with 8 in attendance.

Story Time All Shook Up

In October and November Library Associate Laurie held Story Time Shook Up, a lively event full of songs, movements and stories for children ages 0-5. The themes were story time characters with 150 and 56 children and adults attending respectively.

Baby Bounce

On October 14 and 28, Library Associate Laurie and Librarian Nicole held lapsit story time for children ages 0-2. Each child received their own book to hold during the program. On October 14, 47 children and adults attended and on October 28, 82 were in attendance.

Colorful Tuesdays

On October 1 and November 5, Librarian Nicole and Library Associate Laurie held Colorful Tuesdays! This is a passive program held on the first Tuesday of the month. Coloring supplies and sheets are put out for patrons to enjoy. There were 6 and 9 attending respectively.

Camp Create

On October 15, Library Associate Laurie held a monthly craft program for children ages 6-12. This month's theme was Day of the Dead. Kids made a day of the dead mask with 18 in attendance.

Horror in the Library

On October 3, magician Cris Johnson visited to present "Horror in the Library!" The program involves spooky subject matter, creepy magic, mind reading, and more. Thirty three children and adults attended.

Halloween Party

On October 21, a Halloween Party was held with 110 children and adults in attendance. Volunteers from the Hamburg YES program and an adult volunteer assisted with running the program. Children made bookmarks, necklaces, and popcorn hands. A special spooky scavenger hunt was also held where kids had to find bones scattered throughout the library! Activities included: bowling, a bean bag toss, and a photo taking wall.

Village of Hamburg Trick or Treat


On October 26, the annual Trick or Treat in the village, including the parade was held. The Library served as a stop with staff handing out candy to 506 trick or treaters!

Book Displays

Librarian Trainee Sarah created book displays next to the New Fiction and New Nonfiction for September, October, and November. The September book display was "Dear Diary," featuring fiction and nonfiction diaries, journals, and personal stories, and "Banned Books Week" featuring frequently banned and challenged books. The October book displays were "It Came From the Library" and "Devour Books Not Brains," featuring horror books. The November book displays were "Learn Something New this Know-Vember," featuring science, math and technology nonfiction books, and "No-Shave November," which **is a** month-long journey during which participants forgo shaving in order to evoke conversation and raise awareness for cancer and men's health and wellness.

Banned Books Week

For Banned Books Week from September 23 through September 29, Librarian Trainee Sarah created an interactive display which featured the most challenged books of the last few years, inviting patrons to guess why certain books were banned. The display also incorporated statistics related to books challenged in public libraries, and resources for those who wish to fight censorship and book banning. Stickers and pins were given out to celebrate Banned Books Week.



Transgender Awareness Week

Librarian Trainee Sarah created a display for Transgender Awareness Week, which was November 13 through November 19. Transgender Awareness Week is meant to increase understanding of the transgender community through educating the public about who transgender people are, sharing stories and experiences, and advancing advocacy around issues of prejudice, discrimination, and violence that affect the transgender community. The display featured various materials available for checkout related to transgender history, experiences and lives. The display also provided resources for the transgender community and allies related to local events and support for the transgender community. The display is meant to increase diversity, equity and inclusion in Hamburg Library, and provide a safe and welcoming space for all members of the community. The display will be up the full month of November.



Kid Librarian

Librarian Trainee Sarah hosted three Kid Librarians, one each on September 23, October 7, and October 23. Kid Librarians were Kaydence Schmitt, Lena Binder, and Sienna Franjoine. The Kid Librarians worked with Librarian Trainee Sarah to curate a display of a topic of their choice to feature in the Children's Area. Kaydence chose the theme "Mysteries," Lena chose "Kids in History," and Sienna chose "Fantasy for All Ages."







Each Kid Librarian created a poster to display with their collection.

Class Visits

Hamburg Nursery School

On November 1, Hamburg Nursery School visited with 24 children in attendance. Librarian Nicole conducted a tour of the building including the staff area, read them stories, and let them help discharge movies returned.

Charlotte Avenue Elementary School

On November 8, 48 5th grade students from Charlotte Avenue Elementary School visited. Librarian Nicole gave them a tour including behind the scenes areas. They received a presentation of how the library works including programs and services provided. Nicole read them a story. Afterwards, they did a scavenger hunt to find where things are in the library and how they worked. For example, how much are copies for the copier.

Lake Shore Library

Programs offered this month include:

Preschool Story Time

On September 24, October 1, October 8, and October 15 Librarian Stephanie held storytime for ages 2 to 5, which focused on literacy, listening skills, and socialization. Each session typically includes 3 books, a game or activity, and a craft. There were a total of 107 attendees.

Halloween Party

On October 19, Librarian Stephanie and Library Associate Laurie held the annual Halloween Party with 35 attendees. Children decorated cookies donated by neighbor Sue, made crafts, played bingo, and listened to a story. There was also a costume contest with the winner pictured below.





Adult Book Club

Book Club was held on September 30 and October 28 with Librarian Stephanie. September's title was: *Anxious People* by Frederik Backman. Swedish snacks were served with 7 attendees. October's title was, *Wilder Girls* by Rory Power. Crab rangoon snacks were served with 9 attendees. A newsletter was created and distributed for each book by Librarian Stephanie with backaground information, fun facts, and recommended reads.

Cookbook Club

On October 14, Cookbook Club was held with 13 participants. Participants chose recipes from *Eat and Enjoy Gluten Free* by Laura Strange and shared their dishes pot-luck style.

Hearts and Hands Volunteer Information Session

On October 16, Michael Murphy, director - Community Input, informed potential volunteers about the program and how they can help. This non-profit provides rides and companionship to home-bound or other older adults in need throughout Western New York. There was 1 attendee.

Adult Craft Night

On October 21, Miss Stephanie held adult craft night with 11 participants. Participants made paper mosaics with scrapbook paper donated by a patron. Participants glued paper on chipstock in different patterns.



Narcan Training

On October 30, the Erie County Department of Health presented a Narcan Training program demonstrating the proper use of Narcan. There were 5 attendees, including Senior Page Lisa.

Class Visits

On September 26 and October 10, a toddler class (age 2) from Bright Path visited the library. They visit every other Thursday on Miss Stephanie's off outreach weeks. She read three books and gave each child a sticker. A total of 21 students visited.

Passive Crafts

Halloween and outer space-themed passive crafts were put out in October in the children's area. Kids were encouraged to make a scene with the provided crayons, Ellison cutouts, and glue. There were a total of 30 participants for these crafts.

The easel wipeboard was put out in October to encourage passive programming participation in the library. Questions were asked about candy corn, Halloween costumes, and spring vs. fall. There were 84 participants.

Smarty Pants Daycare

On October 3 and November 4, Library Associate Laurie visited Smarty Pants Daycare to read stories and provide classroom collections. Miss Laurie saw 33 and 40 children respectively.

Scholastic Book Fair

Librarian Trainee Sarah and Page Emily attended Union Pleasant Elementary School's Scholastic Book Fair family event on October 17. They saw approximately 141 people and handed out library card applications, Hamburg Public Library event calendars, and provided a craft with the children attending the event.

Giving Garden

On October 17, Library Associate Laurie presented story time at the giving garden for 44 adults and children. She read stories and sang songs.

Lake Shore Library

Storytime at Bright Path
