Memorial Library (REI) - The Cheektowaga YES group (Youth Engagement Services) moderated the monthly LEGO Clubs and Craft Nights at both the Cheektowaga Libraries. The stuffed animals are photographed reading, using the computers and finally tucking in for a good night's sleep.
