BUILDING & GROUNDS UPDATES

- 9/11, Caretaker Eric Szymborski replaced a group of fluorescent light tubes in the library's central office area with new energy efficient LED tubes.
 - Replacing fluorescent tubes throughout the library is an ongoing project.
- 9/11, A Johnson Controls technician installed replacement control component that was manually bypassed on 6/30 due to malfunction.
 - The replacement control component assists in the proper power cycle regulation of the HVAC system.
- 9/18, B&ECPL Network Support delivered and installed replacement HVAC monitor/control PC. This PC replaces the HVAC monitor/control PC that experienced a hard drive failure as reported in August.
 - The replacement PC is not yet equipped with the correct software to interface with the HVAC system. The necessary software is called Trane Summit.
 - Accessing this software is challenging because it is considered legacy software by its publisher Trane.
 - Trane no longer openly supports this software, and it may or may not be proprietary. This
 makes it challenging for Johnson Controls technicians to procure and install.
 - Ideally, access to the software or an equivalent should be pursued to support the practical functionality of the HVAC system.
 - Some of the software's functions may be achieved manually, but manual control may prove impractical over time.
- 9/25 9/26, A Johnson Controls technician replaced the leaking control valve in HVAC system.
 - The replacement valve was on order since the source of the glycol leak was discovered and temporarily managed on 8/31.
